Maximalism in Contemporary American Literature Nick Levey, 2016-11-18 This book begins a new and foundational discussion of maximalism by investigating how the treatment of detail in contemporary literature impels readers to navigate, tolerate, and enrich the cultural landscape of postindustrial America It studies the maximalist novels of David Foster Wallace, Nicholson Baker, Thomas Pynchon, and others, considering how overly detailed writing serves the institutional, emotional, and intellectual needs of contemporary readers and writers The book argues that maximalist novels not only exceed perceived limits of style, subject matter, and scope but strive to remake the usefulness of books in contemporary culture, refreshing the act of reading Levey shows that while these novels are preoccupied with detail and description, they are relatively unconcerned with the traditional goals of representation Instead, they use detail to communicate particular values and fantasies of intelligence, enthusiasm, and ability attached to the management of complex and excessive information Whether reinvigorating the banal and trivial in mainstream culture or soothing anxieties of human insufficiency in the age of automation and the internet, these texts model significant abilities rather than just objects of significance and encourage readers to develop habits of reading that complement the demands of an increasingly detailed culture Drawing upon a diverse range of theoretical schools and cultural texts, including Thing Theory, Marxism, New Formalism, playlists, blogs, and archival manuscripts, the book proposes a new understanding of maximalist writing and a new way of approaching the usefulness of literary objects in contemporary culture

The book is a much needed critical introduction and a comprehensive survey of the Kazakh literary production and cultural discourses on the nation in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. In the absence of viable and open forums for discussion and in the turbulent moments of postcolonial and cultural transformation under the Soviets, the Kazakh writers and intellectuals widely engaged with the national identity heritage and genealogy construction in literature. This active process of national canon construction and its constant re-writing throughout the twentieth century will inform the readers of the complex processes of cultural transformations in forms, genres, and texts, as well as demonstrating the genealogical development of the national narrative. The main focus of this book is on the cultural production of the nation. The focus is on the narratives of historical continuities produced in the literature and cultural discontinuities and inter-elite competition which inform such production. The development of Kazakh literary production is an extremely interesting yet underrepresented field of study. Since the late nineteenth century, it saw a rapid transformation from the traditional oral to print literature. This brought an unprecedented shift in genres and texts production, as well as a rapid growth of the writing class, urban colonial, and first generations of Soviet intelligentsia. Kazakh literary production became the flagman of republic's rapid cultural modernization and prior to the World War II local publishing industry produced up to 6 million print copies a year. By the 1960s and 1970s, the golden era of Kazakh literature, the most read literary journal *Juldyz* sold 50,000 copies all over the country. Literature became the mass provider of knowledge about the past, the present, and of the future of the country. Because Kazakh readers were hungry to find out about their pre-Soviet past and its national glory, national writers competed in genres, styles, and ways to write out the nation in prose, poems, essays, and historical novels.

The Culture and Commerce of the American Short Story Andrew Levy, 1993-09-24 *The Culture and Commerce of the Short Story* is a cultural and historical account of the birth and development of the American short story from the time of Poe. It describes how America, through political movements, changes in education, magazine editorial policy, and the work of certain individuals, built the short story as an image of itself and continues to use the genre as a locale within the realm of art where American political ideals can be rehearsed, debated, and turned into literary forms. While the focus of this book is cultural, individual authors such as Edgar Allan Poe and Edith Wharton are examined as representative of the phenomenon. As part of its project, this book also contains a history of creative writing and the workshop dating back a century. Andrew Levy makes a strong case for the centrality of the short story as a form of art in American life and provides an explanation for the genre's resurgence and ongoing success.
